# **Grow your family** through adoption

There are over 2,000 children in need of a loving, permanent home through adoption in England. Adopt Coast to Coast, the Regional Adoption Agency for Durham County Council, Cumbria County Council and Together for Children (Sunderland) is calling for more people to consider adoption as a way to start or grow their families.

As well as finding homes for babies and children from across the North-East and North-West of England, in its latest campaign Adopt Coast to Coast is looking for adopters for children who tend to wait longer for their forever home. This includes children over 4 years old, groups of brothers and sisters, children with learning difficulties, health complications or disabilities, and children from an ethic minority.

Adopt Coast to Coast is encouraging would-be adopters to be open to the needs of the children they could be potentially matched with and to consider the many benefits of adopting a child with additional support needs.

Paula Gibbons, Head of Service for Adopt Coast to Coast said: "Adoption has changed significantly in recent years, and we are keen to reassure people that we are very open to applicants from all backgrounds. Even if you're in the early stages of thinking about adoption we would encourage you come and talk with us to find out more. People starting the application now could be matched with a child or children within just 6-12 months."



Adopt Coast to Coast encourages applications from all walks of life, including single people and couples, applicants from the LGBTQ+ community, those with biological children. The team also offers support and guidance throughout the application process as well as on an ongoing basis for both parents and children once a new family is formed; meaning help is always available should you need it.

Adopters Debbie and Allan adopted a little girl when she was four years old, they said: "Our daughter has now been with us for over 6 years. She is an absolutely wonderful grown-up girl now. She is courageous, resilient, beautiful and has the biggest and kindest heart you could ever hope for. She has been through a lot in her life but with consistent love, structure, and support, she is thriving. Without doubt, it has been the hardest thing we have done but the rewards outstrip that 10 times over. So much so, we did it all again a few years later! Our advice is to be open to older children, they are full of love, potential and hope. You just need to unlock it."

Families come in many different forms and Adopt Coast to Coast is keen to reassure the public that there is not a set tick-list of qualities they are looking for – in fact the only rules are that prospective adopters must be over 21 and have lived in the UK for a year. There is no upper age limit, or stipulations relating to employment, income, house ownership or sexual orientation. However, some criminal convictions such as violence against children would make applicants exempt.

## Allotment surplus produce: for family, friends and local food banks during autumn and winter



Whilst most surplus food is produced in the summer. It is important to consider growing, the harvesting and continual provision of fresh food throughout autumn and winter.

Just choose the right plants to grow which are hardy and will be largely free of seasonal pests and the need for watering. The allotment remains productive rather than put to bed for the winter.

Allotment gardening should be a continual opportunity to grow

# "No Dig" approach

Late Winter Early Spring are the months to begin the no dig approach.

Establish beds which are not dug in the traditional way but are built up in layers of home-produced compost into which seeds and plants are sown and planted, sustainable and economical, requiring no artificial fertilizers. Raised beds are an excellent means to approach a no dig regime, just an inch or two annually of home-produced compost or organic matter to enrich the soil and provide the nutrients needed whilst avoiding the back braking need to single and double dig.

## **Avian Influenza** Prevention Zone

Following a change in the risk levels and an increase in the number of detections of avian influenza (bird flu) in kept and wild birds, the Chief Veterinary Officers from England, Scotland and Wales have declared an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ) across Great Britain to mitigate the risk of the disease spreading amongst poultry and captive birds.

This means that from midday on Monday 17 October 2022, it will be a legal requirement for all bird keepers in Great Britain to follow strict biosecurity measures to help protect their flocks from the threat of avian flu.

Allotment tenants must take every precaution to avoid direct or indirect transfer of the virus and contamination of the Allotment Site.

Please ensure effective cleaning and disinfecting of clothing, equipment, footwear and vehicles.

# **HOME & AWAY**



#### This project was intended to bring a sense of community spirit and happiness to all within the Parish following lockdown.

Working alongside local schools, businesses and families to bring back some normality following the disruptions caused by Covid19.

This included;

- Donating a planter to all four Primary Schools in the area. Introducing new school activity to children. Gardening engages all different senses which helps children to develop and recognise without realising. It is believed as children garden, they develop important motor skills that help improve academic skills such as writing, cutting and typing.
- **Installing a seat.** Since lockdown, the Town has seen an increase in socially distanced walks. Low Willington has nowhere for the residents to take a rest and chat with fellow walkers. Providing these seats have created a unity as people started socialising again.
- Planning Away Days for local families. Helping bring families closer together as they can spend quality time in settings other than their home. Making memories and taking time to recharge while aiming to improve mental health.

Four Away Days were organised to the following venues; Northumberland Country Zoo Stockeld Park Scarborough Metro Centre

- Holding a Pantomime. This allowed people to laugh, sing and take part in the joy of theatre. It has increased community spirit, cheer, engagement and involvement with children and adults. Supporting a local venue. This included a visit to Santa in his newly made grotto where children received a Christmas gift.
- Erecting a Fence. Improved Heritage Woodland which is used as family recreation space. We hope this deters fly tipping and improves public safety over a severe drop on the bankside.
- Providing Hanging Baskets to local businesses. This part will start in the Spring / Summer 2023. It will brighten up the High Street by showcasing colour and beauty for all to see. Flowers have longterm positive effects on peoples' moods and bring happiness to all who see them.



## **Greater Willington wins a Northumbria In Bloom** *"Its Your Neighbourhood Award"*

Following a successful application for a tree grant Greater Willington was entered into the Its Your Neighbourhood Competition.

The Northumbria In Bloom Judge came out to look at the improvements that had been made around the Town Green and talk about future plans.

The award was given based on planting of more Silver Birch and Wildflower areas, the Covid Crocus Rainbow, creation of two new Lavender and Herb beds and a Winter flame bed.

Wider work across the parish was also considered including the village planters, bulb planting, work with schools and volunteers.

Based on this work the Town Council has been asked if they would like to enter the main Northumbria in Bloom Competition this year. Which is quite a privilege.

## **Willington** Winter Nights

Durham Constabulary Officers have joined forces with the local neighbourhood watch to spread the work about winter crime.

Houses, outhouses, businesses and vehicles can often be more vulnerable to crime and interference during the darker months. To help see a downward trend in this type of crime Crook Neighbourhood Policing Team have enlisted the help of neighbourhood watch volunteers to deliver crime prevention leaflets around the Willington area.

The leaflets act as a reminder for residents to keep their doors, windows, vehicles and outhouses secure whilst also outlining some useful and reasonably priced equipment to take security even further. These include TV simulators, padlocks, property markings and LED security lights.

They're also full of simple but effective tips to ensure your property is difficult for thieves to target including leaving the radio on when the house is empty, moving bins and garden furniture so they can't be used as climbing aids, never leaving spare keys in obvious places and even signing up to messaging system 'Keep in the Know' or following your local Neighbourhood Policing Team on Facebook to keep up to date with what's happening in your area.

### Helping to keep people safe

Safeguarding policies will always be followed. Where refreshments are offered, food hygiene rules are followed too. Each venue will follow the latest public health guidance around Covid 19, flu and other illnesses. Venues will follow their own age restrictions as appropriate and clearly display them on Locate and within the venue.

### Maintaining confidentiality

If people want to share why they need a Warm Space, they will be listened to and signposted to where they can go for help where possible. Staff and volunteers won't tell anyone else unless they are given permission or it is because of safeguarding.

#### We are here to help

Someone will be present throughout a visit to a Warm Space should they be needed. If people need additional help or support with the cost of living, staff and volunteers will put them in touch with organisations that might be able to help.





# **COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT**

# WILLINGTON MASTERPLAN UPDATE



Before the local last election we promised that we would work with the community to help prepare a Masterplan to shape the regeneration of Willington, with a major focus on the Main Street, which we all know needs significant investment. We delivered and Durham County Council Officers worked residents who engaged and give their views to help shape the Masterplan which was adopted in the summer. Thank you to everybody who got involved.

Having a Masterplan is one thing, but making it happen is another. We worked with Durham County Council to lodge a £12m government Levelling Up Fund bid which will cover Willington, Crook and Tow Law and will have a particular focus on regeneration in Willington. We are due to hear if this bid has been successful in November. Fingers crossed. If it is good news, we are looking forward to working together with the community to drive the regeneration Willington needs.

## FORMER MINERS WELFARE

The fire back in April was a sad end to the Miners Welfare. Many of us have fond memories of our time there over the years.

Following the fire, over the summer the Council worked with the site owners WSS Ltd who took ownership from Spectrum some time ago. First this was about securing the site then finding a way forward. Demolition was the only option and the delay starting work was due to the owner's insurers needing to get involved.

The site is now cleared. At time of writing there are no proposals to develop the site. We will update residents if this changes.

# NEW SPAR STORE LOW WILLINGTON

Having been involved at the beginning of the process to bring the Spar shop and petrol station to Willington we are delighted to see it established as a positive amenity for residents.

Our approaches to Spar Willington have also resulted in the shop becoming a centre for Willington Foodbank contributions along with their own contributions of food and support.

As we had been looking for some time to increase the number of defibrillators in the Town and particularly in Low Willington we also approached Spar about having a defibrillator at their store.

Not only did they agree but they also offered to fund it and they are currently working with GWTC to purchase and site the box.
